

## MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

August 4, 2020

## TUESDAY, AUGUST 04, 2020

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, good morning, everyone. This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for public comment?

MR. TROBMAN: Good morning, Commissioner.

It's Les Trobman, general counsel. We do not have anyone registered to provide public comment this morning.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you, Mr. Trobman. Good morning, Ms. Miller.

MS. MILLER: Good morning, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This brings us to the end of Agenda Items 3 through 7. We're going to take a quick break to reset for the rest of the meeting.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.

everybody back. All right, this meeting is back in order. This brings us to Item 8 on the Agenda. Item 8 is being postponed to a future meeting. Item 9 is being postponed to a future meeting. This brings us to Agenda Item 10, discussion, consideration, possible action regarding communication access for vocational rehabilitation customers.

JASON VADEN: Good morning, Commissioner.

For the record, Jason Vaden, Vocational Rehabilitation Division.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Division has historically used the

Texas Health and Human Services Commissions, communication

services for state agencies, or CSSA guidelines and rates for [unintelligible] access providers. Those guidelines allow noshow fees to be charged when interpreters are scheduled, but the customer fails to attend the appointment. Those guidelines also allow late cancellations fees to be charged when interpreter services are cancelled less than 48 business hours prior to that scheduled service. However, the Rehabilitation Services administration advised the VR agencies that no-show fees are an improper payment and, as such, not an allowable use of VR funds.

As a result, on December 17th of 2019, you called to action, directing staff to notify communication access providers about the revised proposed rate structure to comply with federal guidance and to bring back the feedback received along with proposed rates this year for formal adoption.

However, subsequent to that action, the Rehabilitation Services administration issued a revised guidance providing states with the flexibility to make cancellation fee payments and instructing that the payments are an allowable use of VR funds.

As a result, we've continued to use the CSSA rates that have been in place historically. We also met with HHSC about the CSSA rates, which have not been updated in recent years. We learned that they are reviewing the rates and we anticipate they might be updated in the near future.

Commissioners, this morning, staff seeks direction on the continuation of the VR rates for communication

1 access services in alignment with the HHSC, CSSA quidelines and 2 rates, which include appropriate cancellation fees. Also, in 3 anticipation of future rate adjustments by HHSC, staff seeks 4 direction on making corresponding adjustments to the VR rates to 5 maintain that alignment moving forward. Commissioners, this concludes my remarks 6 7 and I'm happy to answer questions if you have any. 8 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 9 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No questions here, 10 Chairman. 11 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, do we have 13 any motions? 14 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I move that we 15 approve the use of VR rates, which are based on CSSA for 16 interpreting and CART services that were in place prior to 17 December 17, 2019 with the understanding that the CSSA rates 18 might be updated in the future, as discussed by staff. 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Been moved and seconded. 21 We're unanimous. Let's move to Agenda Item 11, discussion, 22 consideration, and possible action regarding statewide 23 initiatives, funding, [unintelligible] Personalization 24 Opportunity Act, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, Adult 25 Education and Literacy, childcare or other state level funds.

Adult Education and Literacy, AEL, Math Assistance [unintelligible] or RFA, 32020-00214.

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FEMALE WORKFORCE DIVISION: Good morning, Chair, Commissioners, and Mr. Serna. For the record, [unintelligible], Workforce Division. Texas Workforce Commissions [unintelligible] grant applications from eligible applicants to collaborate with AEL providers to operate a Math Assistance call center for up to \$500,000. The call center will assist eliqible AEL students in preparing for the mathematics portion of the Texas Certificate of High School Equivalency. Assistance will also be available to AEL students who lack sufficient skills in mathematics to participate effectively in society. An RFA was published in May, evaluators scored the applications resulting in one grant award that is anticipated to start in August of 20. Recent AEL legislation requires all grant applications and awards for the AEL program to be reviewed and approved by TWC's commissioners prior to notification of award to the grant recipient. Therefore, staff recommend commission approval for one grant award for the AEL Math Assistance Call Center. Any questions?

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I do have a comment on this Agenda Item, Chairman. Commissioners, I would like to defer this Agenda Item until the next commission meeting. I would like staff to brief each of the commissioners on the

1 scoring details for this application. At this time, I do not 2 feel that I have sufficient information upon which to base a 3 decision. 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Additional comments or 5 questions? 6 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I know we were 7 looking at taking action on this [unintelligible], Commissioner 8 Alvarez, but I also want us to make sure that we're looking at 9 Texas employers for these tremendous opportunities. So, anyway, I think looking at this might be an opportunity for us. 10 11 FEMALE WORKFORCE DIVISION: Excellent. 12 We'll set up a briefing on both commissioners, thank you. 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This will 14 move us to Item 12, discussion, consideration and possible 15 action regarding guidance on resource utilization or 16 implementation of services and strategies to target disaster 17 relief efforts and public health emergencies, including those 18 funded with the Department of Labors' Disaster Dislocated Worker 19 Grant. 20 ED SERNA: Chairman, Commissioners, Ed 21 Serna, Executive Director Texas Workforce Commission. Really 22 have no staff reports from any of the divisions that are working 23 through the COVID emergency. I would like to report, however, 24 that we did not have to draw down any Title 12 loans yesterday,

as Texas employers deposited approximately \$175 million into the

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fund and that covered all the state benefits that were paid. With that, I have nothing else to report.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, thank you. Any questions for Ed?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, Item 13 is being postponed to a future meeting. Item 14, discussion, consideration, and possible action regarding the Initial High School Equivalency Voucher distribution related to [unintelligible] enacted by the 86th Texas Legislature, regular session.

MAHALIA BALDINI: Good morning, Chair

Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr.

Serna. For the record, my name is Mahalia Baldini with Adult

Education and Literacy. House Bill 3 Section 1.046 enacted by
the 86th Texas Legislature in a regular session of 2019 added a
new section to the Texas Education Code, Section 48.302, subsidy
for High School Equivalency Examination for certain individuals.

This legislation required that the Texas Education Agency enter
into an MOU with TWC when transferring funds to subsidize the
cost of a high school equivalency exam for individuals who are
21 years of age or older. It also required TWC to develop rules
addressing program implementation and eligibility requirements
for high school equivalency subsidy program.

First, issue one of this discussion paper describes the methodology for the initial voucher distribution to AEL grant recipients. Proposed rules under new Subchapter E require the commission to approve an initial high school equivalency voucher distribution by September 1 of each year. The proposed rules also allow for the commission to approve an adjustment to the distributions mid-year or at any other time, based on the voucher usage and demand.

TWC staff will monitor the voucher usage of this initial distribution to recommend any further distribution changes. The methodology used for the proposed initial voucher distribution, as shown in table 1 of your notebook materials, considers individual high school equivalency test-taking data from 2019 through February of 2020.

Issue two describes the plan for AEL grant recipients to distribute vouchers to eligible individuals. Proposed rules under new Subchapter E, state that TWC will prioritize subsidies for current or former AEL program participants, but also states that subsidies may go to individuals who are eligible to receive a subsidy, but are not current or former AEL participants.

Because AEL grant recipients will manage the voucher distribution to eligible subsidy recipients, staff is recommending that TWC provide AEL grant recipients flexibility to develop local policies related to the

distribution of subsidies to individuals who are not current or 1 former AEL participants. 2 3 So, at this time, staff seeks direction on 4 the items described in one and two, distribute high school 5 equivalency subsidy vouchers, as shown in table one, to implement the high school equivalency subsidy program required 6 7 under House Bill 3, and to allow AEL grant recipients to develop local policies related to the distribution of subsidies to 8 9 individuals who are not current or former AEL participants. 10 thank you for your time this morning, and I'm happy to answer 11 any questions. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 13 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No comments at this time, Chairman. 14 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 15 16 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do we have any motions? 17 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move 18 that we approve the distribution of HSC vouchers as outlined in 19 table one and approve allowing AEL grant recipients to develop 20 local policies related to distribution of vouchers to 21 individuals who are not current or former AEL participants, as 22 discussed. 23 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 24 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Been moved and seconded. 25 We're Unanimous. Thank you.

1 MS. MILLER: Thank you. 2 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Move to Agenda Item 15, 3 discussion, consideration and possible action regarding approval 4 at local workforce development for nominees. 5 SHUNTA WILLIAMS: Good morning, Chairman 6 Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr. 7 Serna. For the record, Shunta Williams with the Workforce 8 Development Division. And before you for consideration, we have 9 Workforce Board Nominees for Workforce Solutions Capital Area, 10 North Texas, Northeast Texas, Panhandle, South Plains, and 11 Southeast Texas. This concludes my request and I'm here to 12 answer any questions you may have. 13 Comments or questions? CHAIRMAN DANIEL: 14 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No comments, sir. 15 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 16 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do we have a motion? 17 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move 18 that we approve the board nominees for Capital Area, North 19 Texas, Northeast Texas, Panhandle, South Plains, and Southeast 20 Texas. 21 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 22 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Been moved and seconded. 23 We're unanimous. Thank you. Do we have a legislative report 24 today? 25 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.

MICHAEL BRICK: Good morning, Chairman Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson. For the record, Michael Brick, Governmental Relations. I do have an update this morning. Congressional leaders are continuing negotiations on additional COVID-19 relief legislation, including a potential extension to the Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation Program that expired at the end of July. At this time, an agreement has not yet been reached. We will continue to monitor these negotiations and Congressional action and will keep your offices updated as details emerge related to unemployment insurance or other TWC programs.

Regarding the Texas legislature, House

Chairman [unintelligible] Rafael Anchia has requested TWC to

present at a virtual Town Hall he is hosting on Wednesday,

August 12 at 9:00 AM on the topic of Childcare as Economic

Development. Chairman Anchia has requested that TWC speak on

several points, including the importance of childcare in

relation to economic development, how the COVID-19 pandemic has

affected childcare operations and exposed vulnerabilities, and

what the state can do to ensure high quality childcare is

available for parents throughout the state.

Reagan Miller will be participating in the Town Hall on behalf of TWC. The virtual Town Hall will be open to all members of the Texas Legislature as well. While these

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Town Halls are not formal committee meetings, with the COVID-19
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   pandemic preventing House Committees from holding formal in-
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   person meetings, House Committee Chairs are making use of these
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   virtual Town Halls to hear reports from the public and experts
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   on topics of importance to their committees and the Texas
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   Legislature. This concludes my remarks and I'm happy to answer
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   any questions you may have.
